## "Navigating the Assessment Process: Supporting Families and Learning from Their Perspectives"

A special note goes to *Joyce Branscombe* and *Nicky Byres*, of EventAbility. Joyce and Nicky helped us for the past 12 years and made this a very special and successful event that is now established in our early childhood education (ECE) communities. Your organization and coordinating skills and presence were very much missed through the planning stages and on April 30!

This year, our event "Navigating the Assessment Process: Supporting Families and Learning from Their Perspectives" focused on families and the different stages of assessment and intervention between birth and school ages, and including a bit of the children's life trajectories with their families. This year we tried a new format for our Conference with expert panels and keynote presenters all in one main hall – Room 100, Neville Scarfe building at the UBC Faculty of Education. Our Committee took this decision in order for the event to be viable, and in light of a "no-budget" reality, and hence, no conference organization support except for our own Committee members' own time and in-kind support from their agencies/institutions.

Therefore, together with the Institute for Early Childhood Education and Research (IECER) at OGPR, and the Psychoeducational Research Training Centre (PRTC) at the UBC Faculty of Education, we gratefully thank the Office of the Provincial Advisor, Aboriginal Infant Development Programs of BC, the BC

Aboriginal Head Start Programs, the Supported Child Development Programs (Centre for Ability).

At the same time, the administration and logistics support from the Vancouver Infant Development Program and Developmental Disabilities

Association made this day a reality with registration and day preparations being followed up and taken care through Vancouver IDP.

Here is an overview of the day, starting with our parent panel: Dr Jennifer **Baumbusch** presented a compelling story of her family's journey through assessment for their daughter. She shared such important insights, practical advice and reminded us all about the importance of connection and relationships. This all happened while a beautiful slide show of her daughter's life was showing in the background. Cindy Packer's vivid stories as an adoptive non-Aboriginal parent of three Aboriginal children and the challenges and triumphs in everyday life followed; the images in the background slide presentation, with her children at different ages and stages and sharing different family and community activities in their different roles in the community provided that strong connection with Cindy's account of her journey, together with her husband, as parents raising children with "non-visible" disabilities. The subsequent keynote expert individual and panel presentations throughout the day naturally drew on -- and built upon-each other, with Dr Barb Fitgzerald's "do no harm" presentation. This presentation not only combined assessment practices that both follow the family-centred approach and are rooted on sound developmental principles, but also included a call for conference participants to act out as leaders and advocates for the children and families with whom we all work from our different positions in the

community. Drs Suretha Swart and Carla Merkel's two-part presentation clearly connected the world of schools with what the assessment/testing and follow up processes are with parents' experiences and understanding of these assessment activities (Dr Merkel) and how they "twist and bend" themselves to fit-in this complex journey of assessment, identification and services for their children with special needs (Dr Swart). Michaela Wooldridge session (with the contributions from Michele Tardif and Judie Sahaedeo) explained the different elements that early intervention assessment tools ought to include and provided participants with a very clear review of these guidelines --more specifically referring to the DAYC-2, a standardized tool that is being implemented for early intervention/supported child development programs in BC. Finally, Dr Veronica **Smith** shared with us her views and findings of her current study with parents in different cultures with data collected on site (including India) and illustrating what parents experiences and expectations as they parent children with developmental delays or disabilities and they navigate the assessment process are. Our day was cut a bit short without our closing keynote presentation from **Denise Findlay** who was unable to attend due to health reasons on that day. We hope to have Denise come and present for one of our future event(s). Dr Bill McKee, distinguished member of our steering committee cheerfully wrapped our afternoon with wellwishes and thanks to All who attended.

We run this event thanks to the dedicated and committed effort of an outstanding committee of volunteers – Dana Brynelsen, Diana Elliott, Joan Gignac, Hillel Goelman, Andrea James, William McKee and Mari Pighini. This year, we said "so long" to Beth Hutchinson, Provincial Advisor for the Parent Child Mother

Goose Programs who could no longer continue as a committee member. We thank Beth for her insights during the past year when she actively participated in our committee. We also said "au revoir" (but hopefully not "good bye") to Diane Tannahill whose multiple commitments at the UBC Childcare Centre kept her away from our meetings this year. We thank Diane for all her contributions since 2003 and hope to have her back for 2016! We are thankful for the graphic design contribution of ISABELLE HSU, volunteer at the Society for Children and Youth, SCY, for designing our flyer. We thank Diane Burgar at DDA' Berwick Centre for providing us with a space, with the Including All Children and Families team, at Berwick. As always, deep gratitude to Iris Berger and Dr Marilyn Chapman of IECER, the Institute for Early Childhood Education and Research at UBC's Faculty of Education for their contributions.

Out of the 72 registrations, we received 56 enthusiastic evaluations with ideas for more events – parent voices and Aboriginal content in assessment are very strongly voiced, among other invaluable ideas.
